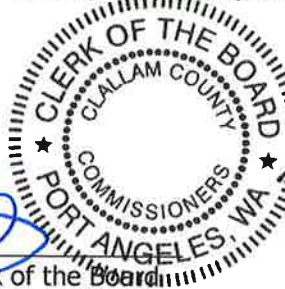

A year ago, the Board of Commissioners faced the 2024 budget with a \$2 million deficit for the first time. There was no discussion of *how* the Commissioners reached such a budget shortfall, but now we know that the Board is often guided by ideology and false information instead of policy — the millions of taxpayer dollars needlessly spent during the Towne Road scandal is a prime example.

After giving Peninsula Behavioral Health \$2 million for a housing project, the commissioners are considering \$2 million more. However, the agency has a troubled history of tax dollar stewardship. Their last housing project, Dawn View Court, was estimated to cost \$140,000 per unit, but when it opened last year, the final cost ballooned by 37% to \$192,000 per unit. The proposed "Northview" project is estimated to cost over \$350,000 per apartment before construction has begun. Taxpayers are being asked to fund many amenities they do not have themselves. Northview will have:

- A community room that walks out onto a 4th-floor rooftop terrace.
- A 34-panel solar array and EV charging station to meet energy code.
- \$15,000 will be spent per unit to add air conditioning.
- Heat-pump water heaters will be installed instead of the traditional, cheaper variety.
- Broadband internet.
- Covered parking.
- A smoking shelter.
- Dog walking areas and a dog washing station.
- Large windows for expansive views of the Olympic Mountains and the Strait of Juan de Fuca in this prime real estate location.
- Each unit will have a dishwashing machine because, according to CEO Wendy Sisk, her agency wants to "make it as easy as possible for people to be successful."

This will be *permanent* supportive housing, meaning residents will stay as long as their income does not exceed a certain threshold. PBH says Dawn View Court is a successful model for permanent housing because there has been no tenant turnover or evictions in the past year—in other words, no one moved out of the program and became independent.

This is not an exclusively dry facility. Drug and alcohol use is permitted.

The commissioners' first tenant in their mission statement reads, "Putting the translated desires of our *residents* into action." Yet, their emails about this housing project seem more like a sales pitch than an attempt to listen to residents' desires. The commissioners serve the people who pay them, not the agencies that ask for taxpayer money.

The budget for this project has become irresponsible and frivolous. The closing of the McKinley Paper Mill is estimated to cause \$1.1 million in lost tax revenue. Commissioner Ozias has taken an anti-business, anti-job stance against private enterprise in his district with the Happy Valley Gravel Pit. Tax-generating employers are disappearing, taxable land is being absorbed into Tribal Trust Land, and the burden of embracing a welfare state is increasingly falling on the residents.

Being generous is easy when it's someone else's money, but when taxpayers are forced to subsidize \$350,000 per apartment for luxury living, the Board of Commissioners will bankrupt this county before it helps people find a path to stability.

Petition for the Removal of Donald Crawford as Director of Parks and Fair Facilities in Clallam County

To the Clallam County Board of Commissioners:

We, the undersigned residents, participants, and supporters of the Clallam County Fair, hereby petition for the immediate removal of Donald Crawford from his position as Director of Parks and Fair Facilities. This petition is based on the following serious concerns regarding Mr. Crawford's conduct and decision-making, which have significantly undermined the fair's operation, financial stability, and overall safety:

****1. Mismanagement of Fair Funds****

Mr. Crawford has reallocated fair funds without consulting the Fair Manager, resulting in the halving of the fair's budget. Advertising, which is critical to the fair's success, was particularly affected. Additionally, \$30,000 earmarked for promoting participation, education, and diversity within the local population was withheld without adequate explanation. Despite RCW 17.75.115 (2)(e) clearly stating that these funds should be used for such purposes, Mr. Crawford referred the matter to the Civil Prosecutor, leaving the Fair Board without clarity on the allocation and use of these crucial funds. As a result, these funds were tied up and not available for use during the 2024 Fair season, forcing many Barn Superintendents to use personal funds to pay for trophies, plaques and other awards not provided by the Clallam County Fair.

****2. Negligence Regarding the Wilder Stage and other crucial buildings on the grounds****

Mr. Crawford has displayed a blatant disregard for the condition and historical significance of the Wilder Stage, which has not been moved in many years. His decision to waive insurance and damage deposit funds for the stage's disassembly and transport poses a severe financial risk and safety hazard. The Wilder family, who sponsors the stage, has explicit instructions regarding its use, and their wishes have been ignored. Mr. Crawford's idea to replace the stage at a potential cost of \$100,000, without securing proper grants, further demonstrates his lack of financial prudence. Furthermore, the Fairboard voted to not rent out the Wilder stage for off sight use. Moreover, his failure to acquire necessary permits at the correct time and reliance on unreliable contractors have led to critical delays in the preparation of fairgrounds facilities.

****3. Contract Mismanagement****

Mr. Crawford has shown poor judgment in signing and then breaking key contracts with Coke and misrepresented to other parties by omitting the fact that the Fair was already in contract with JFFA for the management of the beer garden for the 2024 Fair season. The other party came to a Fairboard meeting intending on presenting their business for discussion only to find out that there was already a signed contract. This was a vital waste of time and resources and reflects poorly on the Fair and the County. Coke and JFFA are both vital partners for the fair. His decision to sign a longer-than-usual five-year contract with Coke without consulting the Board, and then break it reflects irrational planning and jeopardizes the trust and logistical support essential for the fair's success.

****4. Disrespect Toward Fair Board and Fair Manager****

Mr. Crawford has repeatedly disregarded and disrespected the Fair Board and Fair Manager, undermining their efforts and dismissing their advice. The Fair Board, composed of long-time members with a deep understanding of the fair's needs, has been instrumental in ensuring the fair's success despite Mr. Crawford's mismanagement. Their collaborative efforts have ensured the safety and enjoyment of exhibitors, competitors, and animals, despite the challenges posed by Mr. Crawford's decisions.

****5. Disregard for Exhibitor and Animal Safety****

During the 2023 fair, Mr. Crawford arranged for helicopter landings around the rodeo arena. Unfortunately, this resulted in spooked animals, posing a severe risk to the health of exhibitors and their animals. Despite agreeing with the Fair Board that helicopters would not return in 2024, Mr. Crawford coordinated with CCSD for the Project Safer to have this event to be repeated without consulting the board, instead of making it known to Sheriff Brian King that the Fairboard had chosen not to repeat this event on account of safety. This action, which could have endangered exhibitors during the Western Games event, was only halted by the intervention of the Fairboard and Sheriff Brian King, who was unaware of the discussion from September 2023 Fairboard meeting. Additionally, Mr. Crawford's public remarks at a breakfast with several board members, spouses and fair manager during Fair Convention in Eastern Washington, about inhumane euthanizations of animals in his homemade gas chamber, during his time as a groundskeeper at Texas A&M raise serious concerns about his judgment and humanity, particularly in an event that caters to children.

Considering these issues, it is clear that Mr. Crawford's continued leadership poses a significant threat to the financial health, safety, and success of the Clallam County Fair. We believe that his

removal is necessary to protect the integrity of the fair and ensure its continued positive impact on our community.

We respectfully request that the Clallam County Board of Commissioners take immediate action to remove Donald Crawford from his position as Director of Parks and Fair Facilities.

SUBJECT: 2024 State Allocation

The Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) was appropriated \$3.5 million this year by the Legislature to be distributed to qualifying fairs based on their merit and a reimbursement of operating expenses.

On behalf of WSDA and the Washington Fairs Commission, I am pleased to inform you that Clallam County Fair's 2024 state fair fund allocation is **\$72,706.52**.

Enclosed you will find a copy of an invoice voucher indicating the amount of this year's allocation from the Washington State fair fund to Clallam County Fair. A check in this amount will be issued to you from the Washington State Treasurer, unless you have updated your statewide vendor information to include automatic deposit into your bank account.

The fair fund was created under [RCW 15.76.115](#), which sets the amounts appropriated through the State Legislature as well as any specific instructions for use of the funds. In 2021, RCW 15.76.115 was updated to include subsection (e) which states "To support inclusiveness at fair events, a portion of the additional funds provided to fairs as a result of chapter 245, Laws of 2021 must be prioritized to be spent on educational programs and outreach that are reflective of the diversity within a fair's local population."

The Washington State Legislature has declared that it is in the public interest to hold agricultural fairs, including the exhibition of livestock, agricultural produce, products of the farm home, educational contests, displays, and demonstrations designed to train youth and to promote the welfare of farm people and rural living. We know your fair works hard to meet those goals and we celebrate your efforts to share the benefits of agriculture with all who attend your fair.

Fair fund—Created—Treasurer's transfer—Purpose.

(1) The fair fund is created in the custody of the state treasury.

(2) All moneys received by the department of agriculture for the purposes of this fund and from RCW 67.16.105 shall be deposited into the fund. Each fiscal year, the state treasurer shall transfer into the fair fund from the general fund an amount appropriated in the omnibus operating appropriations act equal to:

- (a) \$2,000,000 for fiscal year 2021;
- (b) \$2,750,000 in each fiscal year 2022 and 2023;
- (c) \$3,500,000 in each fiscal year 2024 and 2025; and
- (d) \$4,000,000 in fiscal year 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

(e) To support inclusiveness at fair events, a portion of the additional funds provided to fairs as a result of chapter 245, Laws of 2021 must be prioritized to be spent on educational programs and outreach that are reflective of the diversity within a fair's local population.

(3) Expenditures from the fund may be used only for assisting fairs in the manner provided in this chapter. Only the director of agriculture or the director's designee may authorize expenditures from the fund. The fund is subject to allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, but no appropriation is required for expenditures.

NOTES:

Findings—2021 c 245: "(1) The legislature found in 1961 that it is in the public interest to hold agricultural fairs to train youth, to educate the public about the production of food and fiber, and to promote the welfare of farm people and rural living. The legislature finds that the fair fund was created for the purpose of encouraging agricultural fairs and training rural youth. The legislature finds that despite the original expectations, the fair fund has not increased, and this lack of increased support has made it difficult to maintain youth programs. Research has shown that youth who participate in fairs are more likely to get better grades, attend college, and positively contribute to their families and communities.

(2) The legislature finds that fairs also contribute to economic vitality and cultural heritage by: (a) Providing an opportunity for small businesses to reach a larger customer base; (b) providing agricultural suppliers a platform to showcase new technology; (c) creating numerous seasonal jobs; (d) playing a vital role in fund-raising for nonprofit organizations; and (e) providing a venue for community and cultural events.

(3) The legislature further finds that events held on fairgrounds support both the cultural and economic development of rural communities. The legislature finds that connecting the fair fund to revenue generated on fairgrounds encourages fairs to work with local businesses to increase economic opportunity. Thirty-seven counties have a fair. Benton and Franklin counties share a fair. Mason county currently does not have a fair." [2021 c 245 § 1.]

Effective dates—2011 1st sp.s. c 50: "This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect immediately [June 15, 2011], except for section 951 of this act which takes effect June 30, 2011." [2011 1st sp.s. c 50 § 1802.]

FAIRS SUPPORT FAMILIES

Over the past four years, 4-H in Washington has grown by over 30,000 members. School organizations, Rotary, Kiwanis, Sertoma churches and other groups operate food booths, dunk tanks and other fund raising activities at fairs. The proceeds from these activities fund everything from college scholarships to holiday food baskets.

Art, dance, religious, ethnic and cultural organizations participate in fairs through displays, demonstrations and special events. These activities provide an opportunity for people to explore new ideas in a non-threatening environment where fun and entertainment can be the catalyst for acceptance.

FAIRS SUPPORT SCHOOLS

Many Fairs in Washington partner with their local schools to offer incentives for the school's reading programs. Teachers use these programs to promote reading in their classrooms and at home.

Many Fairs provide school tours for hands on experiences and valuable information about agriculture that can be incorporated in to a dynamic lesson plan for elementary and middle school aged students.

As fewer families live on farms, children need opportunities to learn where their food comes from. At Fair School, pre-K - 4th graders learn about worm composting, plant growth cycles and farm animals.

Activities enhance classroom curriculum in science, math, social studies, and reading. Activities include incubating eggs to watch chicks hatch, can-



dling eggs for quality and learning the nutritional value and uses of eggs. Fair School meets Washington State Essential Academic Learning Requirements.

Many Fairs host art or poster contests in cooperation with schools. Contests generally have a theme. Prizes often include art supplies.

FAIRS EDUCATE PARTICIPANTS

For youth involved in 4-H and FFA, the Fair is the opportunity to showcase their curriculum based project work for the year. The process of getting an exhibit to the fair includes learning responsibility, record keeping, economics, public speaking and more. Studies show youth engaged with 4-H are:

- Nearly twice as likely to get better grades in school;
- Nearly twice as likely to plan to go to college;
- 41 % less likely to engage in risky behaviors; and
- 25 % more likely to positively contribute to their families and communities.
