2026 Public Ratings Baseline and Park-by-Park Assessment

Prepared for discussion by the Clallam County Parks Advisory Board

Baseline date: August 24, 2026

Executive summary

Clallam County’s parks receive very favorable public feedback where enough reviews exist to support comparison. The verified Google Maps review identified rated listings for 20 of the County’s 22 park sites, including Camp David Jr. and several smaller parks whose profiles were initially difficult to match. Salt Creek, Dungeness Recreation Area, Port Williams, Pillar Point, Freshwater Bay, RainShadow, Camp David Jr., Cline Spit, and Robin Hill Farm stand out as strong public-facing assets. The ratings shown here are cumulative Google averages—not one-year ratings—and therefore establish the August 24, 2026 baseline for future apples-to-apples annual comparisons. The principal remaining weakness is online identity: Dungeness Trails lacks a Google place listing, while Fred Orr Ball Fields has a listing but no ratings or reviews.

Method and limitations

This report combines official County facility descriptions with Google Maps ratings, review counts, and recurring themes found in visitor commentary. Google states that its displayed score is the average of all ratings published for a place; Google does not provide an official rolling-12-month score. Google ratings are useful indicators of public perception, but they are self-selected, nonrepresentative, and influenced by listing names, search visibility, tourism volume, and review count. A high rating based on three reviews is not comparable in stability to a similar rating based on 2,000 reviews. “No listing” means that a distinct Google Maps place profile could not be found as of August 24, 2026; it does not mean the park has no users or no public value.

Listings requiring action or special treatment

Fred Orr Ball Fields has a correct Google Maps listing but no ratings or reviews. Dungeness Trails County Park has no Google Maps place listing and should be added by the County.

How the annual comparison will work

The 2026 figures are the starting snapshot. When the same listings are captured again on August 24, 2027, the report can calculate the change in displayed rating and the net increase in published review count for each park. Those year-over-year changes will use the same source, same listings, and same capture date, providing the most defensible apples-to-apples comparison available from Google.

A separate “reviews written during the last 12 months” analysis may be added as qualitative context, but it should not be labeled a complete annual Google rating because Google may include star-only ratings and may not display every contribution in a form that can be completely reconstructed. The cumulative snapshot method above is reproducible and should serve as the official annual trend measure.

Park-by-park assessments

Agnew Soccer Fields

This is a purpose-built community sports property serving organized soccer between Sequim and Port Angeles. Its 4.5 Google rating from 43 reviews indicates favorable user experience, with reviewers especially noting the maintained fields, family soccer use, and convenient parking. Its value is functional rather than scenic: multiple fields, team activity, restrooms, and a central location for youth and adult play. Likely pressure points remain field condition, drainage, parking during tournaments, restrooms, and scheduling. For the PAB, the Google baseline should be paired with field-condition information and feedback from the leagues that use the complex.

Clallam Bay Spit Community Beach County Park

This 33-acre shoreline park provides a mile of beach, Clallam River access, picnic space, wildlife viewing, and a full-service restroom. Google lists it as Clallam Bay County Park, with a 4.6 rating from 158 reviews, providing a solid public-feedback baseline. Visitors value the quiet beach, birding, tide-driven scenery, and convenient stop along Highway 112. The seasonal or unavailable crossing over the river can limit access to the full spit, and some users may not understand where public access ends. Its strongest role is as an uncrowded western-county beach and travel stop; better access-status information and consistent wayfinding would improve the experience.

Clallam Bay West County Park

This 8.64-acre park offers year-round access to roughly a mile of public shoreline west of the Clallam River. Google lists it as Clallam Bay West, with a 4.5 rating from 34 reviews; visitors particularly mention peacefulness, water views, beach access, and the uncrowded setting. Its appeal is simplicity: walking, beachcombing, saltwater views, and a quieter alternative to more developed parks. Limited amenities and uncertainty about access or boundaries remain potential barriers for unfamiliar visitors. Clear roadside identification and a simple online description would help visitors understand why and how to use it.

Camp David Jr.

Camp David Jr. is an 8.75-acre, reservation-only group camp on Lake Crescent with a main lodge and kitchen, sleeping cabins, accessible restrooms, a swimming area, docks, campfire space, and a grass playfield. Its Google listing shows a strong 4.7 rating from 41 reviews, giving the County a useful public-feedback baseline for this specialized facility. Reviewers repeatedly praise the beautiful and secluded lakefront setting, lodge and kitchen, cabins, docks and swimming area, helpful staff, and its suitability for youth camps, family reunions, retreats, and weddings. The principal cautions are that visitors must reserve the entire facility or attend an organized event, desirable dates can be difficult to secure, and some reviewers describe the cabins and bunk-style accommodations as rustic or in need of work. Future annual tracking should pair the Google baseline with occupancy, repeat bookings, facility-condition information, and evaluations from organized groups.

Cline Spit Community Beach County Park

Cline Spit is a small but useful access point to inner Dungeness Bay, with a boat ramp, parking, shoreline access, and a vault toilet. Google lists it as Cline Spit County Park, with a 4.5 rating from 408 reviews—one of the larger review samples in the County system. Visitors like the protected-water setting, sunsets, fishing, kayaking, birdwatching, and the ability to reach the beach without a long walk. The park is small, parking can be tight, and the public portion of the spit is limited by adjoining private property. The park succeeds as a neighborhood-scale water-access site, but boundary and access signage should remain exceptionally clear.

Dungeness Landing County Park

Dungeness Landing provides boat access, picnic tables, benches, a birding platform, fishing access, and a full-service restroom on outer Dungeness Bay. Visitors consistently appreciate the broad bay views, birds, quiet atmosphere, and convenient place to pause close to Sequim. The site is modest rather than destination-scale, and low tide can make the shoreline feel more like mudflat than beach. Wind exposure and limited activity options may disappoint visitors expecting a conventional recreation park. Its best identity is as an accessible scenic overlook, birding stop, and working water-access facility.

Dungeness Recreation Area

This 216-acre park and campground combines 66 campsites, bluff views, meadows, forest, equestrian and walking trails, a playground, and direct pedestrian access toward the Dungeness National Wildlife Refuge. The very large review count and 4.7 rating indicate broad, sustained visitor satisfaction. People especially like the scenery, wildlife, peaceful trails, campground setting, and proximity to Dungeness Spit. Common limitations include summer crowding, no hookups, confusion over refuge fees and pet restrictions, and the substantial walk required to reach the lighthouse. This is one of the County system's flagship parks and should be monitored separately for campground operations, trail condition, and visitor-information clarity.

Dungeness Trails County Park

This 395-acre property provides an extensive nonmotorized trail network for walking, running, bicycling, and horseback riding. No Google Maps place listing could be found for the park as of August 24, 2026; the County should add and maintain an official profile so visitors can locate the trail system and future ratings can be tracked. Users are likely to value the forest setting, variety of routes, multiple activity types, and its role as a large open-space asset near Sequim. Parking, trailhead visibility, mapping, and potential conflicts among horses, bicycles, runners, and walkers are the principal issues to watch. Until a listing and sufficient review history exist, trail counts and direct user surveys will be more meaningful than online ratings.

Eagle Point County Park

Eagle Point is a small, largely undeveloped 1.2-acre Lake Crescent access site with fishing and shoreline access. Its Google listing shows 5.0 from only three reviews, so the score should be treated as a very small-sample observation rather than a stable performance measure. Reviewers value the quiet lake-edge setting and the rare opportunity for public access along the south shore. Capacity is extremely limited, with roadside parking for only a few vehicles and little room for conventional park amenities; the highway proximity and inconspicuous entrance can also make access feel uncertain. The County should view this as a sensitive access point rather than a high-volume park and prioritize safe identification and resource protection.

Fred Orr Ball Fields

Fred Orr is the western County's dedicated ball-field complex near Beaver and is maintained with help from the Forks Lions Club. A correct Google Maps listing exists, but it currently has no ratings or reviews, so no Google score can be reported for the 2026 baseline. The facility provides organized baseball and softball capacity in an area with relatively few comparable public facilities. Players and families are most likely to judge it on field surface, drainage, dugouts, restrooms, parking, and travel distance. Periodic feedback from leagues and tournament users should remain the primary evaluation method until a meaningful online review history develops.

Freshwater Bay County Park

Freshwater Bay offers a concrete boat launch, beach access, picnic areas, restrooms, and more than 1,400 feet of public tidelands. Its 4.8 Google rating suggests that visitors strongly value the scenery, sheltered-water access, kayaking, fishing, and relaxed atmosphere. The upper picnic area is seasonal, and the site has fewer developed amenities than Salt Creek or Dungeness. Boat-launch congestion, parking, and clarity about seasonal facilities are the most likely pressure points. This is a highly successful water-access park whose modest review count may understate its importance to local users.

Lake Pleasant Community Beach County Park

This two-acre lakefront park includes a boat launch, picnic tables, a play area, vault toilets, and about 280 feet of shoreline. Google lists it as Lake Pleasant County Park, with a 4.4 rating from 99 reviews, indicating generally favorable public experience. Reviewers value the lake access, family gathering space, picnic tables, playground, and basic amenities. Dock and launch condition, parking, swimming safety, and seasonal crowding are the main operational concerns. The PAB should track completed capital work and compare future rating and review-count changes with feedback following major repairs.

Mary Lukes Wheeler County Park

Mary Lukes Wheeler is a quiet Dungeness River access site with informal forest paths, picnic opportunities, and rocky riverbank areas. Its Google listing shows 4.6 from 89 reviews, providing a useful baseline for this relatively low-intensity park. Visitors like the shade, river sounds, uncrowded atmosphere, family access, and easy short walks. Its low profile is part of the charm, but it also means limited signage, narrow access, few amenities, and uneven or root-covered paths; the river can also be swift. This park works best as a neighborhood nature-access point rather than a developed swimming destination.

Marlyn Nelson County Park at Port Williams

Port Williams is a compact one-acre park with a boat ramp, beach, picnic opportunities, and extensive adjoining public tidelands. Its 4.7 rating from more than 600 reviews demonstrates that a very small park can have major regional visibility and use. Visitors praise the water and mountain views, beach walking, wildlife, kayaking, fishing, and peaceful atmosphere. Criticisms tend to concern limited parking, basic restroom facilities, exposure to weather, and crowding at popular times. Protecting reliable launch access and clearly separating vehicle, trailer, and pedestrian movements should remain priorities.

Panorama Vista County Park

Panorama Vista is a small bluff-top viewpoint overlooking Sequim Bay and adjacent tidelands. Visitors value its quiet setting, bench, wildlife, broad water views, and sense of seclusion close to town. Its 4.5 rating is good, though lower than the County's leading destination parks. The major limitation is that bluff erosion has eliminated safe public beach access, while older reviews and third-party descriptions may still imply that visitors can walk down. Correcting outdated online information and communicating the park as an overlook—not a beach-access site—should be a priority.

Pillar Point County Park

Pillar Point combines a concrete small-boat launch, beach access, a covered picnic area, vault toilets, and a striking Strait of Juan de Fuca setting. A 4.7 rating from more than 200 reviews shows that visitors see it as a worthwhile western-county destination. People like the views, beachcombing, fishing, paddling access, and convenient picnic stop along Highway 112. Rough weather, tides, launch conditions, and relatively basic amenities limit comfort and accessibility for some visitors. Maintaining the launch, toilet, shelter, and accurate tide-and-safety information will protect what users value most.

Quillayute River County Park

This 13-acre park provides about 700 feet of river frontage, parking, fishing access, and a vault toilet near the confluence that forms the Quillayute River. Visitors value the scenery, fishing, wildlife, and convenient opportunity to stop near Forks and La Push. The Google rating is positive but based on only eight reviews, so it is not statistically stable and may change sharply from a few new ratings. The park is basic, with limited developed recreation and potential concerns involving current, bank condition, litter, and informal use. Its management focus should be safe river access, cleanliness, and clear boundaries rather than tourism-scale development.

RainShadow Disc Golf Park

RainShadow is a free, dedicated disc golf property with wooded and open fairways, substantial elevation changes, concrete and other tee surfaces, quality baskets, signage, benches, and a portable restroom. Google place data currently show 4.7 from 140 reviews, while UDisc provides the stronger sport-specific baseline: 4.6 from about 1,948 ratings. Players most often praise the technical design, shot variety, scenery, maintenance, signage, and the two-loop layout that returns to the parking area after nine and eighteen holes. The recurring criticisms are steep or slippery slopes, punishing rough and lost-disc potential, occasional overgrowth, limited trash facilities, and relatively weak amenities compared with the quality of the course itself. In my view, RainShadow is one of the County's strongest specialty recreation assets; annual tracking should include Google, UDisc overall rating and count, and UDisc subratings for upkeep, design, tees, signage, amenities, and scenery.

Robin Hill Farm County Park

Robin Hill Farm is a 195-acre mix of forest, meadow, and wetland with roughly 3.4 miles of foot trails and 2.5 miles of equestrian trails. Its 4.6 Google rating from 243 reviews shows that it has a much stronger public profile than the earlier search suggested. Visitors appreciate the quiet setting, varied landscape, family-friendly walking, dog walking, picnic opportunities, and access for hikers, runners, cyclists, and riders. The principal drawbacks are limited amenities, insects in season, muddy areas, and the need to watch for horses and manure on shared routes. Trail maps, entrance visibility, and clear multiuse etiquette remain the most useful opportunities for improvement.

Salt Creek Recreation Area

Salt Creek is a 196-acre flagship park combining camping, tidepools, beach access, wooded trails, World War II remains, picnic and play facilities, and access to the Striped Peak trail system. Its 4.8 Google rating from more than 1,500 reviews reflects exceptional visitor enthusiasm and makes it the County's clearest online success story. Visitors repeatedly praise the tidepools, dramatic shoreline, views, wildlife, history, hiking, and campground setting. Common concerns involve seasonal crowding, campsite fit for larger vehicles, variable beach access, limited services, weather exposure, and the need to plan around tides. The County should protect the ecological and historic features that distinguish Salt Creek while continuing to improve visitor orientation, campsite information, and high-use maintenance.

Three Waters County Park

Three Waters is an undeveloped 8.5-acre nature-access park with a gravel trail to more than 1,000 feet of Dungeness River frontage and Bear Creek along its west side. Its Google listing shows 3.3 from only six reviews, the lowest displayed score in the table but far too small a sample for a firm conclusion. Positive comments mention the serene riverfront and picnic setting, while criticism specifically points to weak signage and difficult access. Limited parking, amenities, and river-safety information are additional constraints. The park should remain low intensity, but a clearly marked entrance, simple map, and basic stewardship information could improve both usability and future public perception.

Verne Samuelson Trail County Park

The Verne Samuelson Trail follows Valley Creek for roughly one to one-and-a-half miles west of Port Angeles and is jointly maintained by County and City parks staff. Its confirmed Google listing shows 4.2 from 29 reviews. Users like the wooded creek corridor, wildflowers, birdlife, dog walking, and uncrowded neighborhood character. The recurring concern is access—especially very limited parking at the north end—along with low visibility, windfall risk, inconsistent published trail length, and uncertainty about connections. Better mapping, distance information, and coordinated City-County trailhead signage would materially improve the experience.

Recommended annual tracking protocol

- Use the same annual capture date, preferably during the same month, and record rating plus total review count.
- Save the direct Google Maps link and a screenshot for every listing so naming changes can be detected.
- Ask Google to create, merge, or correct profiles for parks that lack a distinct official listing.
- Do not rank parks with fewer than 10 reviews without a prominent small-sample warning.
- For RainShadow, separately record Google rating/count and UDisc overall rating/count plus UDisc category scores.
- Pair public ratings with operational measures such as visitation, campground occupancy, trail counts, maintenance concerns, and direct user surveys.
